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


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



Chief of the Naval staff Admiral Naveed Ashraf visited Thailand to attend eighth Indian Ocean Naval Symposium (IONS) Conclave of Chiefs at Bangkok. The event involved panel discussions on issues related to cooperation in maritime security of Indian Ocean and Blue Economy- ways forward for sustainable development of IONS members.

During IONS Conclave of Chiefs, bilateral meetings between Chief of the Naval Staff and naval leadership of IONS member states were also held. CNS called on Commander of Oatar Emiri Naval Forces, C-in-C of Royal Thai Navy, Deputy C-in-C of Russian Navy, Commander of Royal Navy of Oman, CNS of French Navy, Commander of Iranian Navy, Fleet Commander of Royal Navy, UK and Vice Chief of Japan Maritime Self Defence Force and discussed matters of mutual interest. Admiral Naveed Ashraf focused on PN contributions to regional maritime security and emphasized on collaboration between the regional navies to enhance maritime security of the

## PAKISTAN NAVY INDUCTS **5<sup>TH</sup> ATR AIRCRAFT** IN AVIATION FLEET

The induction ceremony of 5<sup>th</sup> ATR of Pakistan Navy was held at Naval Aviation Base PNS Mehran, Karachi. Chief of the Naval Staff Admiral Naveed Ashraf graced the occasion as Chief Guest. The newly inducted ATR aircraft, acquired from PIA, is equipped with day and night flying capability to undertake ferry, logistics support, Medical Evacuation (MEDEVAC), General Evacuation (GENEVAC),

and training missions. Pakistan Navy is in the process of acquiring ATR aircrafts from various sources and is modernizing them to carryout maritime reconnaissance and anti-submarine warfare missions at sea. Being a commercial aircraft it has very low operating cost as compared to tailor made military aircraft. This is the 5th aircraft which has been acquired for the purpose. Speaking on the occasion, Chief of the Naval Staff highlighted the importance of evolving geostrategic environment in the Indian Ocean Region and emphasized the need to have a potent naval force in order to counter emerging challenges. He underlined the significance of strong maritime defence for Pakistan and reiterated that induction of modern

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aircraft will enhance Pakistan Navy's capability of safeguarding our maritime frontiers.

Earlier during his welcome address, Commander Pakistan Fleet Vice Admiral Muhammad Faisal Abbasi highlighted that induction of ATR will ensure sustained operations from western seaboard through regular logistics and personnel movements.

Later, Chief of the Naval Staff handed over ATR documents to Commander Pakistan Fleet. The ceremony was attended by Flag Officers, Ex Aviators of Pakistan Navy and reps of Pakistan International Airlines (PIA). & &

The significance of blue economy is vital for countries like Pakistan to draw appropriate and sustained economic benefits. The United Nations Sustainable Development Goal, related to oceans, requires all major stakeholders including Government agencies, policy makers, NGOs, scientists, researchers and local





communities to step-up their efforts towards conservation and sustainable use of oceanbased resources. Initiatives that help identify avenues of untapped blue potential can provide an impetus to overcome development and sustenance challenges, as well as reinforce national security. Understanding and recognizing the Oceans, the allied potential therein and what ails the blue world would be the first step.

I wish all the MARSEW participants an insightful interaction and a pleasant stay at Pakistan Navy War College. Pakistan Navy is divesting resources for the socioeconomic uplift of the less privileged segments of society, especially along the coastal belt. Earlier, Rear Admiral Javaid Iqbal, Commandant Pakistan Navy War College during his welcome remarks gave a brief rundown of various activities during the conduct of workshop.

The nine day workshop brings about improved understanding of the maritime security and geopolitical underpinnings in the wider Indian Ocean. 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# CNS OPEN SHOTING CHAMPIONSHIP

**7**th Chief of the Naval Staff Open Shooting Championship was held at Pakistan Navy Shooting Range, PNS BAHADUR, Karachi. Chief of the Naval Staff Admiral Naveed Ashraf was the Chief Guest on occasion.

Pakistan Navy clinched the title of CNS Open Shooting Championship 2023 with 35 Gold, 17 Silver and 13 Bronze medals whereas Sindh team secured the Runners up position. Almost 400 shooters from all over Pakistan participated in the week long Championship. 

Bahrain. 🗞 🗞






## PNS TUGHRIL VISITS SALALAH PORT DURING REGIONAL MARITIME SECURITY PATROL

Course Commissioning Parade of 120<sup>th</sup> Midshipmen and 28<sup>th</sup>(SSC) was held at Pakistan Naval Academy (PNA), Karachi. Chief of the Naval Staff Admiral Naveed Ashraf graced the occasion as the Chief Guest. The commissioning contingent comprising 88 Midshipmen out

of which 60 were from Pakistan, 01 from Kingdom of Bahrain and 27 from Kingdom of Saudi Arabia along with 44 officers of SSC Course including 12 lady officers.

While emphasising on geostrategic environment, Chief of the Naval Staff asserted that peace and stability in South Asia will remain elusive unless the long-standing issue of Kashmir is resolved in accordance with the aspirations of its people and the UNSC resolutions. He urged the international community to play its role in cessation of human right violations and atrocities in the

illegally occupied Indian held Jammu and Kashmir whose citizens must be allowed to exercise their right of self determination.

During his address, the Naval Chief also emphasised the immediate need to end the sufferings in Gaza as indiscriminate use of force on Palestinian civilians is a gross violation of human rights and war crimes that must cease forthwith. He further reiterated that Pakistan would continue its diplomatic, moral and principled support to Palestinians and urge for a just, comprehensive and enduring solution to the Palestinian question, in line with relevant UN resolutions. He added that Pakistan looks forward to a stable and secure Afghanistan; which is a key to regional integration, growth and prosperity.

The Chief Guest felicitated the commissioning term and their

parents. He commended the parents for instilling a spirit in their children to serve the nation, which ultimately led them in joining this prestigious Service. He also lauded Pakistan Naval Academy for imparting quality training and expressed his hope that cadets from friendly countries trained at PNA will serve as our brand- ambassadors to enhance bonds of endearment and affinity. Chief of the Naval Staff also advised the vouth on new dimensions of warfare, which is the use of social media for disinformation, that has become an essential segment of fifth generation warfare.

## RENEWABLE-POWERED UNCREWED SURFACE VESSEL (USV) OCIUS BLUEBOTTLE

The Bluebottle is designed and manufactured by Sydney-based Ocius Technology, The solarwind or wave-powered vessel uses a retractable rigid sail to provide wind propulsion. Photo-



electric cells on the sail can drive its motor. In the absence of sunlight and wind, the Bluebottle has a unique flipper and rudder device to steer and propel itself. It has a top speed of five knots and the ability to operate at sea indefinitely in sea states up to 7 (wave heights of six to nine metres). Sensors allow both safe and effective control of the system and identification of other vessels. Sensors include radar, and electro-optic and infra-red cameras.

# **NEW STEALTH SUBMARINE**



China's latest non-nuclear submarine, the Type-039C Yuan Class, features a distinctive angled sail. We can now be confident that this is part of a sonar stealth technology. Other countries are also pursuing this general technique, but China is the first to field it. The Yuan-class, their latest non-nuclear powered attack type, is the most numerous class of AIP (airindependent power) submarine in the world. And now these have been seen with new and unusually shaped sails, hinting at the implementation of advanced technologies.

Dec 1959:	The first multi-national maritime exercise under CENTO, MIDLINK-1 was held in Karachi. (Ships and aircraft from the USA, UK, Pakistan, Iran, Turkey and Iraq participated).
Dec 01, 1969:	The first of the three Daphne class submarines built for the Pakistan Navy by M/ s Arsenal De Brest of France was commissioned as PNS/M HANGOR(S-131).
Dec, 1969:	The Pakistan Navy Education Trust established its first School.
Dec 16, 1970:	The Pakistan Naval Academy (PNA) was commissioned as PNS RAHBAR at Manora Island.
Dec 29, 1970:	The depot unit of the Submarine Service was commissioned as PNS ABDOZE at PN Dockyard.
Dec 04, 1971:	Submarine PNS/M GHAZI (S-130) met an accident and sank in the approaches to the Indian Naval Base at Visakhapatnam, Bay of Bengal.
Dec 04, 1971:	The destroyer PNS KHAIBAR (163) and minesweeper PNS MUHAFIZ (163) lost after being hit by missiles while on patrol in the Arabian Sea during the 1971 India- Pakistan War.
Dec 09, 1971:	Indian Navy ASW Frigate INS Khukri was sunk by PNS/M HANGOR (S-131), 30 NM west of Diu Head. This was the first ever sinking of a man of war by a submarine after World War II.
Dec 16, 1971:	Upon termination of hostilities in the eastern theatre, 1500 Naval personnel (Officers, CPOs, sailors and civilians) were taken as Prisoners of War.
Dec 16, 1971:	Patrol Craft PNS RAJSHAHI (P-140) broke through the Indian Naval blockade of Chittagong and arrived in Penang, Malaysia on 21 December 1971.

Dec 31, 1981:	Navigation and Direction (ND) School shifted from PNS
	HIMALAYA to a newly built training complex near KARSAZ.
	The complex was later commissioned as PNS BAHADUR.



### BOOK REVIEW GWATAR BAY TO SIR CREEK Review by: Cdre Aitazaz Khalid

The author, Vice Admiral (Retd) Iftikhar Ahmed Rao HI(M) is an ex-naval officer with thorough background knowledge in maritime affairs. He is also the author of the book "Elements of Blue Economy" published in 2020, encompassing all essentials elements of maritime sector and is considered as a reference document in maritime segment in Pakistan.

The book "Gwatar Bay to Sir Creek: The Golden Coast of Pakistan; History & Memoirs" is covered in three sections with 15 chapters. The first part, "Makran - A Journey Through History", the author explores the west coast of Pakistan, highlighting its natural beauty and potential tourism industry it can generate. While describing the history, author in a very chronological order narrates that how over the centuries region has been influenced by rulers like Alexander the Great, ancient Hindus, Arab and Central Asian Muslims, Mongols and later Baloch tribes who established the Khan of Kalate dynasty and later Makran state in 18th century.

The author in detail discussed about the true ownership of Gwadar port; being at that time part of State of Makran. The city and its port had a rough political history between the Khan of Kalate and Sultanate of Oman in the late 18<sup>th</sup> century. In 1784, then Khan of Kalate provided refuge to Omani Sultan, Sultan bin Ahmed seeking for asylum after the conflict over the throne within royal family. As a gesture of goodwill, locally called "mahmannawazi", Khan of Kalate shared Gwadar half of revenue as maintenance allowance, till he returned to Oman in 1792.The British East India Company, who by that time became a strong political



and military power in Indian Sub-Continent in order to safeguard their own interest in the region used their influence and allowed Oman to control Gwadar port by entering into various agreements. The British by these agreements bounded Sultan of Oman not to accede any part of Oman to anyone except British. After independence in 1947, Pakistani successive governments attempted to reclaim the port through diplomatic negotiations with Oman and the British. Pakistan acquired Gwadar on 08 September 1958, paying around 2,700.00/-British pound to the Sultan of Oman.

In the second part of the book, **"Bracing the challenges-Memoirs"**, the author shares his experiences as young naval officers in the 1970s coastal belt of Makran, and later as helicopter pilot highlighting the

region's geography, socio economics, and cultural heritage. After independence, Pakistan's coastal belt lacked economic development and a strong naval presence due to landward-looking mentality of decision makers, The Navy on its part, apart from building strong naval set-up in region, also played a significant role in community services, developing high standards academic institutes and a stateof-the-art hospital. As author rightly narrates navy development in coastal belt from infancy to a formidable force in following words **"epic things start from humble beginnings, even as you move to greater heights, pay respect to your beginnings"** 

The chapter Makran Coastal Highway gives details about 653-kilometer road connecting Karachi to remote coastal cities in region in order to bring economic activities in coastal belt. Its construction began in the early 2000s. The highway offers stunning views of the Arabian Sea, rugged cliffs and serene beaches including famous Kund Malir Beach, Hingol National Park, Princess of Hope rock formation, Hammerhead and Buzi pass.

The last few chapters under the overall heading of "Command and Humility" discusses raising the new Coastal command in navy and how it attributed to overall defence of the coast line stretching at west from Jiwani in Balochistan to the east in volatile Sir Creek area in Sindh. As author rightly says that **"every organization need to review their set-up as things change due expansion or change in the operational environment"**.

The book further highlights the beauty of the Sindh coast in east Pakistan, Manora Island, and the Arabian Sea while discussing the environmental imbalances caused by mangrove forest (the seventh largest in the word;) decline and threats to the unique Indus Delta biodiversity.

The chapter on Sir Creek, traces the land dispute between Sindh and Kutch states since 1907, digs into historical accords, the 1965 Run of Kutch conflict between India and Pakistan and the UN Tribunal's resolution in 1965. The author uses maps and authentic historical references to provide a clear account of the issue and Pakistan's stance on it, making it accessible to even common layman.

Author has dedicated the final chapter to the construction of marine canal by Pak Marines in 2005 in Sir Creek area. He said that the topic was very dear to his heart, as it related to construction of a canal to facilitate the local fishermen to safely navigate for fish-catching. The author being Commander Coast spearheaded the project. The canal, built by Pak Marines was constructed to access the fish-rich Uthanjo darya creek, which was difficult to access from the Pakistani side due to its marshy terrain. Pak Marines constructed the canal in marshy land in the scorching heat of August and September using only shovels. Later, this effort by navy also received national appreciation on national media appraisal as published in Dawn newspaper on February 09. 2012. "Canal to help fishermen avoid Indian waters" This book is an amalgamation of multiple disciplines related to social science subjects i.e. history, cartography, topography, anthropology, sociology, geography, defense and strategic studies, international relations, economy and law. The author's extensive bibliography showcases his research, making it a valuable reference for future studies. This book should be essential read compulsory read for development policy practitioners, for all the diplomats and all the commercial stakeholders who are looking to invest in Pakistan's coastal areas. **\*** 

## PREVENTION OF PREVENTION OF BEART DISEASES HROUGH IFESTYLE MODIFICATION

hronic non-communicable diseases are assuming an increasing importance among the adult population in both developed and developing countries. The prevalence of chronic diseases is showing an upward trend in most countries and for several reasons this trend is likely to increase in coming years. Amongst non-communicable diseases, cardiovascular/heart diseases at present are one of the leading causes of death in developed countries. Recent studies have shown that changes in lifestyle and behavioral patterns may favor the onset of chronic diseases.

Hence, a large percentage of non-communicable diseases are considered to be preventable through modification of risk factors (factors that make occurrence of a disease more probable).

Identification of risk factors and promoting healthy activities aimed at primary prevention play a significant role in the control of chronic diseases. These risk factors play a significant role in non-communicable disease related morbidity and premature mortality. Understanding risk factors is crucial for development of effective strategies for disease prevention and management. "Risk factors" include both nonmodifiable (which cannot be altered) and modifiable (which can be changed or controlled) factors. Non-modifiable risk factors for heart diseases include age, gender, family history, genetic factors, personality type etc. Modifiable factors include cigarette smoking, high blood pressure, elevated serum cholesterol. diabetes, obesity, sedentary habits, stress, alcohol consumption. etc.

Preventing heart diseases through lifestyle modification is a crucial aspect of maintaining





cardiovascular health. Adopting healthy lifestyle may lead to significant reduction in heartrelated issues. Below are some key lifestyle modifications that can help prevent incidence of a heart disease:

#### **Healthy diet**

Consumption of a well-balanced diet rich in fruits, vegetables, whole grains, lean proteins and low fat dairy products may reduce the risk of developing heart diseases, Limiting intake of saturated and trans-fats, cholesterol, sodium and added sugars is also beneficial.

#### Maintain healthy weight

Keeping one's BMI within healthy range by losing excess weight reduces the strain on heart thus, by managing weight the risk of obesity-related diseases can be reduced.

#### **Regular exercise**

Regular exercise such as brisk walking, jogging, swimming or cycling is recommended. Aim for at least 150 minutes of moderateintensity exercise per week. **Quit smoking and alcohol** 

**Consumption** Quitting smoking and alcohol consumption can improve heart health and lower the risk of heart disease.

#### Manage stress

Chronic stress contributes to heart diseases therefore, practicing stress-reducing techniques such as meditation, yoga and deep breathing exercises may be helpful. Adequate sleep

Lack of sleep can contribute to various health issues including heart diseases.

#### **Control blood pressure**

Monitor and manage your blood pressure through lifestyle changes and through medicines as prescribed by a healthcare professional.

#### **Manage diabetes**

Uncontrolled diabetes can increase the risk of heart disease.

#### Monitor cholesterol

Lowering cholesterol by reducing intake of saturated fat and avoiding trans-fat is essential.

#### Regular health check-ups

Regular check-ups with healthcare providers for monitoring blood pressure, blood sugar levels, cholesterol levels and overall cardiovascular health is advisable.

Rapid expansion of evidencebased research over the past years has contributed sufficiently to clarify the role of healthy lifestyle in preventing and controlling premature morbidity and mortality caused by noncommunicable diseases. Hence, it can be said that adopting healthy life style choices lead to healthy and graceful ageing and reduces healthcare costs associated with medical treatments, medications and hospitalization. Additionally, regular health check-ups ands screening can help identify and manage risk factors, especially those that are non-modifiable. However, those who have existing health issues or are on medication should consult their healthcare provider before making significant lifestyle changes.

To conclude, it can be said that a healthy lifestyle is a powerful preventive measure against a wide range of diseases. By making informed choices regarding diet, physical activity, sleep and other lifestyle factors, individuals can take proactive steps to protect and improve their health over the long term. It is also worth mentioning that, a strong social support system plays an important role in motivation of individuals and is linked to better health outcomes therefore, engaging in activities such as group exercises or team sports can foster social connections which lead to mental and emotional well-being of an individual. 🗞 🗞
